The February meeting will be at the Medford Library at 7:00 P.M. Feb 19. Jennifer Chudrimsky from Wild Birds Unlimited Nature Shop in Rib Mountain will present information on the huge loss of breeding birds and what we can do about it. The Cornell Lab of Ornithology has developed Seven Simple Actions to help save the songbirds. Helping birds can be as simple as making changes to everyday habits. Jennifer will go over each of the seven steps, and make recommendations based on each step. ## **2023 Yearly Club Member Species Addition**

Last month's CHIRPS listed 231 species documented by club members within Wisconsin for 2023. Since then Gayle Davis has provided four more species: vesper and field sparrows, Cerulean warbler, and orchard oriole to bring the total to 235.

## **2023 Summary of Area Audubon Christmas Bird Counts**

Club members are heavily involved in six area Christmas Counts. The results that follow are from 278 hours of birding by individuals or groups over an area of 1,060 square miles. Fifty-nine species were recorded among 15,838 individuals. Impressive numbers but down 21% from last year's totals of 20,113 in the same areas. Weather can significantly alter these totals. This year's lack of snow cover had a definite impact. Large amounts of data over many years are the best measuring stick of trends. Citizen scientists are valuable contributors. Thank you.

## **40 Years of Spencer Audubon Christmas Counts**

Four decades of Spencer counts that started in 1983 have recorded 80 species and 218,508 individuals. These numbers came from 2,059 party hours traveling almost 20,000 miles by vehicle and 389 miles on foot. This year had 38 species among 2996 individuals. The highest totals are 45 species in 2003 and 8,043 individuals in 1990. Memories of participants are countless.
